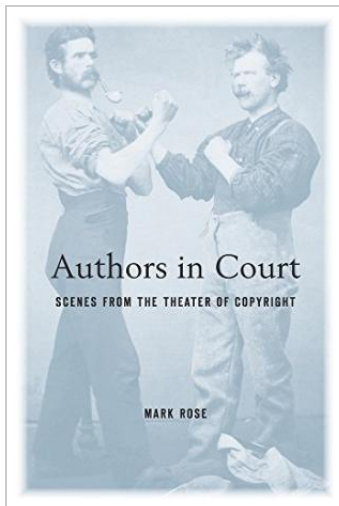




Authors in Court: Scenes from the Theater of Copyright (Paperback)
