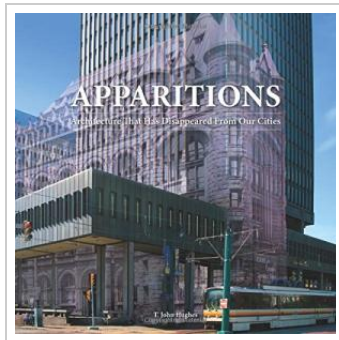




Apparitions: Architecture That Has Disappeared from Our Cities
