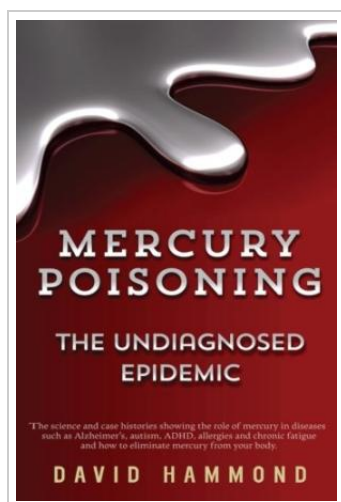



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Mercury Poisoning: The Undiagnosed Epidemic (Paperback)

The Environmental Protection Agency's limit for mercury is an intake of 7 micrograms per day for a 70 kg person. If you have dental amalgams (these silver-colored fillings are actually 50% mercury) the World Health Organization estimates you are exposed to 4 to 21 micrograms per day. Over decades this adds up to hundreds of milligrams of the element that toxicologists consider the most toxic non-radioactive element. If you eat 100 grams (3.5 ounces) of tuna, you take in another 35 micrograms, or 5 times the daily limit for the average adult. We are also exposed to mercury through some vaccines...
